
CAREER IS HOW WE RELATE TO THE WORLD AROUND US

The environment is where we live

- Our environment is also shaped by numerous small decisions and policies around us.



SO, THIS IS NOT (JUST) ABOUT CHOOSING A GREEN JOB

NOR IS IT JUST ABOUT A CHANGE TO CONSUMPTION PRACTICES



Increasingly the focus is on systems and on work, employment and production

The Green New Deal (or similar initiatives in different countries)

- A political approach
- Which foregrounds a system approach.
- But also the politics of production
- This (re)engages us with ideas around work and career

This raises a range of questions that people need to address in their careers

Moral questions

- What kind of work should I do (and not do)?
- Do I understand the environmental implications of my work?
- Do I have a responsibility to try and change the environmental impact of my work and my organisation?

Skills questions

- Do I have the skills to make a positive contribution to the environment?
- How are my skills going to have to change as my organisation and work changes?
- Do I have the skills to influence environmental change within my organisation?

CAREER IS HOW WE CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE TO OUR WORLD

We have proposed the 5 signposts for socially just career guidance



Build critical consciousness	Help people to understand the what is happening to the environment, what it means for their career and the career of others and think about how they might react to it.
Name oppression	Help people see where climate injustice exists and to notice where it is shaping their career. Support them to organise in solidarity with others experiencing similar issues.
Question what is normal	The idea of `normal life' and `normal politics' have become very challenging. Career guidance should include talking to people about how the concept of normal life and career is changing under pressure from the climate crisis.
Encourage people to work together	Help people to recognize the limits to individual action. Support them to consider how they can come together with others to access support and enact change.
Work at a range of levels	As a professional you should raise these issues at an individual, group, organisational, social and political level. Also encourage your clients to recognise that they also need to act on various levels as they drive their careers forward.

SO WHAT MIGHT THIS LOOK LIKE IN SCHOOLS?



This is not news to many young people


- Young people are already engaging with these issues.
- We cannot meaningfully talk about careers in schools without recognising this context.
- So, how can we bring this into the careers curriculum?

Auditing the curriculum

- Do you have a careers / guidance curriculum?
- Does it address the environment directly?
- Where can you actively make the connection?

The CDI framework (England)

What do you need to know and be able to do to have a positive career...





People need to see the big picture by paying attention to how the economy, politics and society connect with their own life and career. Careers practitioners should address this by engaging learners in:

- Evaluating different media, information sources and viewpoints
- Exploring and responding to local and national labour market trends
- Exploring and responding to trends in technology and science
- Exploring and responding to the relationship between career and the environment
- Exploring and responding to the relationship between career, community and society
- Exploring and responding to the relationship between career, politics and the economy



Using this in curriculum to address environmental issues in career

Grow throughout life	Reflecting on your own impact on the environment and challenging yourself to do more to challenge climate change.
Explore possibilities	Gathering information on the environmental policies and impact of occupations, sectors and organisations.
Manage career	Considering how different climate change scenarios might impact on your career and developing individual and collective responses.
Create opportunities	Exploring how environmental activists, NGOs and sustainable businesses got started and how they are resourced and operate.
Balance life and work	Explore different life and work balances and considering their environmental impacts. Reflecting on how the normative career pattern impacts on the environment.
See the big picture	Looking at the interaction between climate change, environmental policies and career.

An example activity

Divide students into small groups and encourage them to investigate different sectors of the economy.

Sector	Key companies	How does this sector impact the climate	How will climate change impact on this sector

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Summary

- Climate change and wider environmental issues are becoming increasingly important for our careers.
- It is not meaningful to talk to people about their careers without recognising the changing context of environmental change.
- A critical approach, linked to wider consideration of social justice, provides us with the best framework for considering these issue as part of career management.
- Career education provides an important space within which we can get individuals thinking about environmental issues.
